It has been the greatest honour to be the first CEO of the St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust. To have the opportunity

to build from scratch a Trust of 25 schools, consisting of 8,000 pupils and 1,200 staff across five local authorities is quite unique and an absolute privilege.

We were ensuring that Bishop Patrick's vision for Catholic education materialised; protecting, developing, growing and nurturing all within our Catholic communities, was our aim. We faced many challenges along the way. We inherited schools with large financial deficits, nine out of the 25 schools were in Ofsted categories when we started and there had been a lack of investment in our school estates. However, we faced these challenges with energy, enthusiasm and some really talented colleagues and, over time, we overcame these hurdles and after four years our Trust is thriving and successful.

I am retiring this summer and am delighted to say that our new CEO will be Kevin Gritton. He has been a hugely successful Headteacher at the biggest school within our Trust, Saint Benedict. Kevin has lived and breathed our Trust for the last four years and is in a good position to build on our strengths and to know where we need to develop further.

I shall miss much about this role, but

I shall probably miss being with the children the most. The higher up an organisation you rise, the more difficult it can be to remain in touch with the young people. At the end of the day, we are all here to serve them and do our best by them, creating, as Pope Benedict said, future Saints!

Eco-garden dreams set to come true at eight Trust schools

Eco-gardens will be created at eight schools across the St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust after they secured funding from East Midlands Airport.

Blessed Robert Sutton, in Burton, St Thomas', in Ilkeston (pictured right), and St Edward's, in Swadlincote, will share £34,000 from the airport's eco-gardens project.

English Martyrs', in Long Eaton, Holy Rosary, in Burton, St George's, St Joseph's and St John Fisher, all in Derby, will work with a wildlife expert on their garden plans before the amount of funding they will receive is confirmed in the Autumn. The eight schools were among 26 that applied for funding

The eight schools were among 26 that applied for funding from EMA's eco-garden project.

All schools were asked to submit designs for gardens or green spaces that substantially boost biodiversity and lead to improved wellbeing.

The proposals were evaluated by a panel of experts which included representatives from the airport's corporate social responsibility team, Derbyshire Wildlife Trust and the parks, green spaces and environmental management team at South Derbyshire District Council.


The submissions were assessed against several criteria. The designs needed to demonstrate how the gardens would make existing space environmentally richer and more diverse, improve biodiversity, stimulate outdoor learning, and have



wellbeing benefits.

A wide range of designs were submitted, with proposals ranging from creating wetlands, living classrooms, sensory gardens, vegetable patches and wheelchair accessible green spaces.

Such was the standard of entries that the judges decided to award funding to all participating schools. Some will be awarded the exact amount of funding that they asked for, while others will be given support to refine their designs to maximise biodiversity and wildlife benefits.



The cost of these will then be re-evaluated and schools will be awarded the appropriate funding to deliver their schemes.

Jo Pettifer, Sustainability Project Co-ordinator for the St Ralph Sherwin CMAT, worked with schools on their garden proposals.

She said: "I am delighted that eight of our schools have been successful in securing funds. The design ideas include 'Flight Path' inspired by the ducks which regularly land on St Thomas' school roof, 'The Lost Gardens of Holy Rosary' which is a magical secret garden idea and The Sutton Way Eco Garden: a garden inspired by Blessed Robert Sutton's Mission Statement – Love, Respect, Hope, Kindness, Resilience - it shows how those values will help us make a

more sustainable world. The pupils have worked so hard, carrying out wildlife audits, planning their designs, discussing them with their teachers and filming presentations for the competition. I am so grateful that East Midlands Airport is rewarding all that hard work, what a triumph."

'Good' rating for St John Fisher

following DCI

St John Fisher Catholic Voluntary Academy has been given an overall rating of good following a Diocesan Canonical Inspection.

Inspectors from the Diocese of Nottingham said that the quality of Catholic Life, Religious Education and Collective Worship at the school were all good.

How well leaders and governors promote, monitor and evaluate the provision for the Catholic Life of the school, and the provision for Collective Worship, were graded outstanding.

The report said that St John Fisher CVA was well supported by the St Ralph Sherwin CMAT, which is committed to increasing all aspects of school improvement.

Inspectors said that pupils were proud to be a member of the St John Fisher community and they enjoyed the responsibilities the school provided for them, including being part of the chaplaincy team, the pupil council and as eco-champions.

The report said: "St John Fisher is a caring school with a family feel which is evident when you enter the school, and which is spoken about by so many of the stakeholders."

Commenting on the Catholic Life of the school, they said: "The Catholic Life of the school is highly valued by all stakeholders and leaders have ensured that it is the driving force for future school improvement across the school. This has a tangible impact on the aspirations that school leaders, staff and parents have for the future of the pupils in their care."

Pupils' charity work and fundraising was also highlighted in the report. Inspectors said: "A very large majority of pupils value opportunities to raise money for local, national and global charities and they have done so with great success. Most importantly, they understand why raising money for those in need is important. A Year One



pupil said, 'We raise money because Jesus is our example, and this is how we show we love one another."

Inspectors described St John Fisher as a calm and spiritual school community "where staff want the best for pupils in their care."

Angelina Brett, Headteacher, said she was delighted with the outcome of the inspection.

She said: "Due to the COVID pandemic, we had to wait much longer than we thought we would for the inspectors to visit us! We have worked hard to maintain our high standards and I am so proud of the St John Fisher CVA community. The children, staff, parents, governors and parishioners shared their love and support of the school with the inspectors, highlighting that we are a family who are committed and care deeply for each other."

Trust CEO, Sean McClafferty, said: "I speak for all our Trust schools when I say that we are so proud of this achievement at St John Fisher.

"I know the whole school community, led by Angelina Brett, has worked incredibly hard to ensure that enhancing the Catholic ethos has been the priority for everyone.

"The fact that leaders and governors of the school have been judged as outstanding in their work shows how much progress is being made.

"Well done to all."

Plans revealed for unique new building for St Mary's CVA

St Mary's would be the UK's first biophilic school as part of a pilot scheme for the Department for Education.

Plans have been revealed for an innovative new building for St Mary's CVA in Derby.

St Mary's would be the UK's first biophilic school as part of a pilot scheme for the Department for Education.

Biophilia is an approach that focuses on connecting those

Biophilia is an approach that focuses on connecting those inside a building with nature and increasing biodiversity through design.

The aim is for the new building to be net zero carbon in operation – which means that the amount of carbon emissions added is no more than the amount taken away. St Mary's original building in Broadway, Derby, was destroyed by fire in October 2020 and the school has been based at St James House in Mansfield Road, since April 2021.

Amanda Greaves, Executive Headteacher at St Mary's, said: "We are delighted to finally be able to share the wonderful news relating to our proposed new school. We would like to thank our parents and carers for their unwavering patience and understanding in supporting us, and we look forward to this new and exciting phase in the



development of our new school." Trust CEO, Sean McClafferty, said: "Caring for our environment is at the heart of our Trust vision and we are thrilled that one of our schools is part of this pilot scheme for the DfE, which is all about increasing biodiversity and sustainability, something we are working on with all 25 of the schools in our Trust family."

"But now it is time to hang up my trackies, spend more time with my family and friends, and improve my own fitness, taking time to plan ski holidays without pupils!"
